Statement of Originality

ARTICLE REQUIREMENTS

- Preferred length of the text is 20 000 characters (about 3000 words) to 40 000 characters (about 6000 words) – including the main text, abstracts, key words, tables and diagrams, footnotes and bibliography
- Division into numbered sections with numbered internal title
- Bibliography in alphabetical order should be attached to the article
- In-Text Citations APA style
- Abstracts (up to 250 words)
- Key words (5-8)

REVIEW, COMMENTARY ON REVIEW, REPORT

- Up to 20 000 characters (about 3000 words)
- In-Text Citations APA style



The title of the review should be arranged as follows: Authors of the review Name(s) and Surname, (rev.), colon, Authors of the article Name(s) and Surname, comma, the title of the article, comma, Name of the Publishing House, comma, year and place of publishing, comma, pp. (the entire number of pages of the article), full stop.

TEXT LAYOUT

- 1,5 line spacing
- Margins 2.5 cm
- Font Times New Roman
- Justified text
- Internal titles (enumerated 1,2,3 etc.)
- Inverted commas for quotations

FOOTNOTES

- Only content or discursive footnotes
- In addition: the first footnote is concern affiliation of the author/authors of the text

CITING AN AUTHOR OR AUTHORS

A Work by One Author

Research by Smith (2000, p. 54) supports... (Smith, 2000, p. 54)



A Work by Two Authors

Research by Wegener and Petty (1994, pp. 76-78) supports... (Wegener & Petty, 1994, pp. 76-78)

A Work by Three to Five Authors

- List all the authors in the signal phrase or in parentheses the first time you cite the source Research by Kernis, Cornell, Sun, Berry, & Harlow (1993) supports...
 (Kernis, Cornell, Sun, Berry, & Harlow, 1993)
- In subsequent citations, only use the first author's last name followed by "et al." in the signal phrase or in parentheses

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Research by Kernis et al. (1993) supports... (Kernis et al., 1993)
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A Work by Six or More Authors

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Harris et al. (2001) argued...
(Harris et al., 2001)
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Two or More Works in the Same Parenthesis

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Research by Berndt (2002) and Harlow (1983) supports... (Berndt, 2002; Harlow, 1983)
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Two or More Works by the Same Author in the Same Year
